From Clutter to Creation: Young Minds Tackle Big Waste

The Public Hygiene Council Inspires Youths to Rethink and Reuse to Reduce Bulky Waste Littering

SINGAPORE, **27 OCTOBER 2024** – Demonstrating a blend of creativity and sustainability, the Public Hygiene Council's Bulky Waste to Wonder Competition 2024 finals took place this morning at South Beach Tower, coinciding with guarterly SG Clean Day.

For the second year running, the Public Hygiene Council (PHC) – in partnership with the Ministry of Education (MOE) and J.O.E Eco Alliance – has organised the innovative Bulky Waste to Wonder Competition, with the objective of challenging young minds to transform unwanted bulky waste into new functional items. The competition is open to secondary school students nationwide, and aims to help youths to understand the impact of improper disposal of common bulky items, and inspire them to explore innovative ways to repurpose and reuse these valuable resources.

Bulky Waste Littering

- Despite all Town Councils offering residents free removal services for up to three items monthly, the improper disposal of bulky waste remains a persistent issue at HDB housing estates. Many residents are unaware that abandoning large furniture items at common areas such as void decks and lift landings constitutes littering. This lack of awareness contributes to the ongoing problem of bulky waste cluttering shared spaces within residential communities.
- Improperly discarded bulky waste creates several hazards. It is unsightly and detracts from the aesthetic appeal of communal areas. More importantly, such abandoned items can become breeding habitats for pests, thus posing public health risks. Furniture made of flammable materials presents a fire hazard, endangering residents' safety. Additionally, bulky waste left at common areas may obstruct evacuation routes, hindering residents' ability to exit safely during emergency situations.
- 5 PHC will continue educating the public on proper bulky waste disposal, working with Town Councils and grassroots organisations to raise awareness of removal options, including free monthly services for HDB residents, and fee-based collection for private estate residents by private collectors.

Bulky Waste to Wonder Competition 2024

To promote sustainable waste management, PHC's Bulky Waste to Wonder Competition encourages participants to repurpose unwanted bulky waste. This year's run of the competition was launched in May 2024, and has attracted a significant increase in participation – with 68 entries from 13 schools in 2024, compared to around 30 entries from



eight schools in 2023. This highlights the growing interest among Singapore's youth in upcycling and sustainable waste management.

- 7 To support participants in their design process, an in-person workshop was conducted by furniture designer partners of PHC. This workshop equipped participants with valuable knowledge, techniques and tips, for creating effective designs.
- Participants of the 10 shortlisted entries were subsequently invited to work with expert industry partners to bring their designs to life, transforming them into functional new pieces of furniture. A panel of distinguished judges selected the winners this morning. The completed furniture pieces will be on display at South Beach Tower Lobby from 19 October to 15 November 2024. They will also be showcased at the Sustainable Christmas Market at South Beach Walkway from 16 to 17 November 2024.
