For more than a decade, Mr Edward D'Silva has been rallying the communities in Singapore to come together and take greater ownership in keeping our home clean. Having been in the Public Hygiene Council (PHC) since 2013, and serving as the Chairman since 2015, a constant challenge that Mr D'Silva faces is encouraging Singapore residents to take on greater ownership in the cleanliness of Singapore and reduce our reliance on cleaners.

Time to Clean Up Our Act

Singapore is often referred to as the 'Garden City', a testimony to the presence of lush greenery and our well-organised streets that are typically cleaned of litter.

However, if we look deeper, we will realise that Singapore is not truly clean. It is not difficult to find cigarette butts hiding beneath the bushes, discarded items left next to a full trash bin, or even dirty public toilets. The question we need to ask ourselves is: Are we a cleaned city or a truly clean one?

We need to recognise that relying on cleaners to clean up after us is not the solution. We need to be inherently clean by binning our trash and always cleaning up after ourselves. Littering degrades our living environment. It also attracts pests, which could in turn spread diseases. The COVID-19 pandemic has shown us how hygiene can be an effective defence against the spread of a disease. We cannot afford to drop our guard when it comes to the cleanliness of our home. We need to be more mindful of our actions, as well as the public health consequences that comes with it. A piece of litter may seem harmless, but it shows our indifference to the potential public health threats that come with it.

We have to start by cleaning up after ourselves all the time, and binning our trash responsibly. Leaving behind our trash next to a bin even when it is full, is no different from littering. The rightful place for trash is inside the bin.

We can also influence those around us to do their part as well. Whenever we witness littering, we should stand up to the culprits and point out their wrongdoing. Exerting social pressure would make potential litter-bugs think twice about littering.

When more and more of us start speaking up, we can be assured that we are on the right track to becoming a truly clean city.

Engagement with Key Stakeholders to Keep Singapore Clean

As we move into the endemic phase of COVID-19, the Public Hygiene Council reactivated engagement with its key stakeholders to revisit the challenges of keeping Singapore clean.

On 12 October 2022, more than 20 representatives from 17 Town Councils attended the briefing for the quarterly SG Clean Day. This was the first face-to-face meet up with the town councils after three long years. The networking session provided a good platform for the PHC to re-connect with the town councils and receive feedback on littering issues in the estates.

The PHC appreciates Town Councils' strong support over the years to implement the quarterly SG Clean Day and we look forward to continue the good efforts with Town Council in keeping our estates clean and hygienic for all residents to enjoy.







The PHC's Youth Action Group (YAG) members got off to a flying start with the group's first project update to YAG Co-Chair and PHC Council Member David Chua on 12 October 2022.

Amongst the various ground-up efforts being explored by the 5 YAG members include an upcoming challenge statement that the group intends to work on with the National Youth Council's Youth ChangeMakers initiative. This would involve coming up with and implementing effective anti-littering ideas at Singapore's parks and beaches to eliminate trash and waste littered by park and beach users.

As mentors and role models to their peers, YAG members aim to provide useful and meaningful mentorship and advice to their youth peers to make a positive change for our environment in their daily lives and habits.

On Sunday, 30 October 2022, more than 400 people together with residents of Moulmein-Cairnhill, volunteers and dormitory residents took part in a Orchard Road clean-up in support of the Public Hygiene Council's (PHC) quarterly SG Clean Day initiative.

As part of the initiative which started in April 2021, sweeping will cease at all public parks, gardens, park connectors, open areas and ground levels of housing estates from 6am to midnight on every SG Clean Day. This aims to raise public awareness about the amount of litter that piles up without cleaners' intervention. For this event, the PHC partnered the Orchard Road Business Association (ORBA) and Singapore Tourism Board (STB) to rally major shopping malls and retailers in Orchard and the heartlands to cease sweeping at selected public spaces in their malls'. Supporting mall partners included CapitaLand, City Developments Limited, Far East Organization, Frasers Property Retail, Lendlease Singapore, Ngee Ann City, Tang Plaza and UOL Group.



The Clean Public Toilets campaign bv the National Environment Agency (NEA) was launched by Mr Yam Senior Baey Keng, Parliamentary Secretary for Sustainability and the Environment, at Our Tampines Hub on 30 November 2022.

Mr Edward D'Silva, Chairman of the Public Hygiene Council (PHC), was invited to support the campaign launch. The entourage spoke with members of the public to encourage them to do their part to keep public toilets clean. The PHC supported the campaign in 2021, and continues its partnership with NEA this year to promote wider awareness of good toilet hygiene habits through its channels and network. The PHC is working together with the People's Association to place in-situ materials at selected community clubs' toilets and screen the campaign video at community clubs. Through its Neighbourhood Toilets Community Group (NTCG) initiative, it is also teaming up with operators of over 100 coffeeshops, to nudge cleaners and users to keep toilets clean.

The Clean Public Toilets campaign 2022 aims to encourage users to continue the acts of "Flush, Clean, Bin, Dry". Posters and wall stickers will be put up in public toilets located at hawker centres, selected coffeeshops, parks, beaches, participating petrol stations and community clubs.

Let's Keep Tekka Clean

GREENNUDGE

Why do we recycle?

For many, it is believed to be the de facto solution to our environmental problems. In other cases, people do it to keep up with the rising trend of sustainable living. Recycling has been growing in prominence, but questions about its effectiveness began to surface amidst recent developments in the industry. As people seek answers, recycling is revealed to be a dysfunctional system in need of change.

In Singapore, recycling has been promoted to be essential in resolving our looming waste management crisis – our only landfill at Pulau Semakau will be fully exhausted at current rates of waste generation. Recycling will channel used materials back into production lines, reducing the need for new resources and leads to less waste being generated. At least, that's what we've been told.



Educating the next generation

Schools need to create their own environmental education syllabus that includes not only theoretical knowledge but also hands-on learning experiences. This way, environmental knowledge will be contextualised, allowing students to feel a stronger connection to the issue at hand.

Learning journeys to green places of interest such as incinerator plants and MRFs in Singapore can be conducted. Bringing students on a tour to these sights will allow them to understand the operational challenges of managing waste domestically.

They will gain new insights into the economics of waste management and recycling, adding new layers to their perspective of the sustainability landscape. In addition, schools can also form partnerships with green groups to enhance learning experience. Teachers can tap into these organisations' expertise and industrial knowledge, giving students a more thorough understanding about existing efforts to promote sustainability. One way is through coorganising activities such as coastal clean-ups. Teachers can assist in consolidating learning points for students before and after the activity, facilitating knowledge retention.

Recycling is broken. The things you thought were being recycled probably end up in places you've never imagined. It validates the waste we produce, masking us from the real problem at hand: unsustainable consumption. It's time we revamp environmental education and create a generation that consumes responsibly - towards a zerowaste future.
